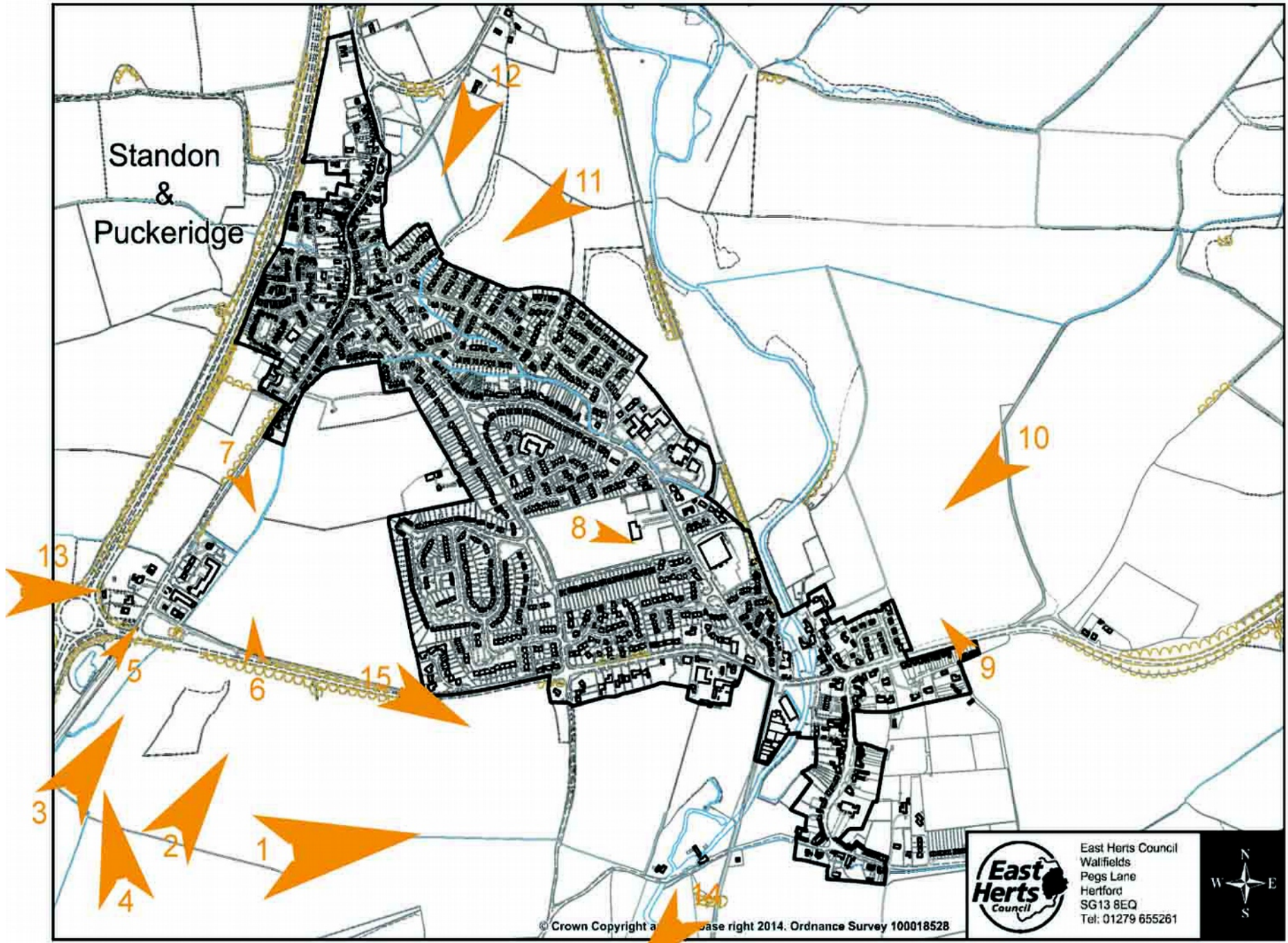


Standon

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1. View from footpath on the brow of A120 looking towards the village of Standon with its 13th/14th Century Church and steeple.



2. View from footpath 17 over the brow of the local farmland towards the top half of the Café Field, Puckeridge.



3. View from the footpath 17 To the lower end of the Café Field, Puckeridge, with Bowls Dell to the right.



4. View toward Mentley Farm showing the rise of land to the West of the A10. The A120/A10 roundabout is in the middle distance



5. The Cambridge Road looking North from its junction with the A120.



6. The view towards the Cambridge Road and the Co-Op Land (SLAA site 034) from the footpath that runs alongside the Café Field (SLAA site 004). You can clearly see the change in level along the length of the nearest site. The Old Buffalos head (now a residence) is the first house seen.



7. This view is taken from the Co-Op land (site 034) on the Cambridge Road. From here you can see the nature of the Café Field (site 004) and its rise toward Hammarsfield Close and Plashes Close. Note no houses are visible on the skyline.



8. This view is taken from the middle of the recreation field looking towards Standon in particular (SLAA site 003)Lilymead and (SLAA site 037). Note the area is well camouflaged by greenery but also that the rise of land is marked. The yellow building in the middle ground is Enfield Safety Supplies, industrial area.



9. We are now looking from the dwellings near the end of Stortford Hill towards the Back of Town Farm Crescent, over SLAA site 037



10. The view from Public Bridleway 3 towards Town Farm Crescent and SLAA sites 037. Note in the background the rise of land beyond Puckeridge showing how Standon and Puckeridge are nestled into a natural valley.



11. Looking from the top corner of Wickham Hill (SLAA site 016) and towards Park Drive. Again this view emphasizes the rural character of housing nestled in a valley with established trees to break up the skyline.



12. Taken from the western part of SLAA site 016 shows the low lying nature of the area towards The Moat and the rear of Cannons Court. This area has been known to flood at times due to tributaries flowing through the area.



13. This view is taken from the Millenium Marker to the North of St Edmunds College grounds looking towards Puckeridge, in particular the Café Field (SLAA site 004) showing clearly how visible this site is and what an impact any housing will make on this area.



14. A view taken of the Laundry Meadows Standon Lordship in the height of summer. This area is important to wildlife and walkers alike and many come to enjoy the area. This area forms part of the band of interest for the A120 bypass!!



15. A view taken from the footpath at the top of the Café Field (SLAA site 004) looking towards Standon.
